

controversies that have been worked up over the matter which indicates there are certain influences in the community that are anxious to make this recruiting move on the part of the Minister a failure. Personally I take not the slightest notice of such attacks, but I certainly do think that they tend to destroy that harmony in the community that is so essential at the present time. The more they demonstrate their bias the more likely they are to damage their cause, and the greater will be the body of public feeling behind the Government. In my opinion the Government is backed more solidly by public opinion to-day even than it was on March 16.

MELBOURNE, May 10.

Mr. Mackinnon (Director-General of Recruiting), replying to statements that the recent boom in recruiting was due to the fact that boys of 18 were allowed to enlist without the consent of their parents, said that for the week ended May 4—that was before regulation 8 came into effect—498 had enlisted in New South Wales. Of these 339 were single men, 171 being between the ages of 21 and 35 years, 121 between 18 and 21, and 47 between 35 and 45.

A novelty which contributed considerably to

great display of popular enthusiasm during a big effort in the city on Friday to raise recruits was a number of official motor cars, gay with miniature flags, and bearing a prominently displayed invitation to "jumpin"-to jump in, meant that a man, in a few minutes would be at the central recruiting depot, and in record time he would be converted into a soldier. It was the close of a very much improved recruiting week in the State, and was known as "Five Hundred Day," the objective being to raise 500 recruits throughout the State.

The Mayor presided and the A.I.F. reinforcements and bands took part. The Governor (Sir Hamilton Gould Adams) was present with the Recruiting Minister, and Mr J.M.Hunter represented the Queensland Government.

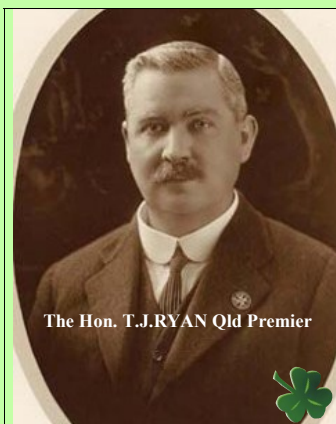
A feature of the demonstration was an announcement which Mr. Orchard said would thrill Australia and show Premier Ryan's sincerity in the matter.

Mr. Hunter made the an-

nouncement which had roused anticipation and interest. It proved to be to this effect: That Mr. Ryan, at the request of Mr. Orchard, had consented to the first thousand recruit's under the new scheme being called Ryan's thousand. The announcement met with a mixed reception.

The Mayor had to appeal for order and unity. The Opposition Leader (Mr. McCartney) announced that his party would join wholeheartedly with the Premier and his friends in the recruiting work and he hoped that the thousand would be raised.

Mr. Orchard's plans include a recruiting depot in Albert Square brilliantly lighted, with chairs and bands to get recruits at night interspersed with recruiting appeals. A meeting of business men has been called to consider means for insuring every recruit for £200. The enlistments last week were 92 fit and 43 unfit; total 135 offering.

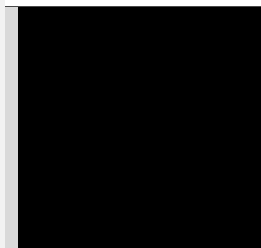
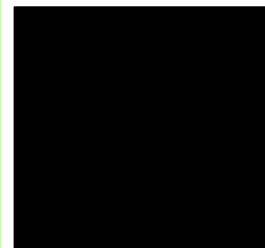

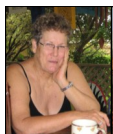

THE "RYAN THOUSAND."

Subject sent by Elizabeth Pidgeon

The need in Europe, for World War 1 troop reinforcements, brought a request from Britain for an Australian contribution. The then Labour Prime Minister, Billy Hughes, although Labour was philosophically against it, sought to introduce conscription.

The conscription issue attracted to Ryan considerable opprobrium from conservative quarters. From 1915 he threw his weight behind the effort to defeat Germany, through the recruiting drive. In 1916 he visited Australian troops at the front, where he began to see and hear reasons against compulsory enlistment. Ryan supported the plea for reinforcements, but only on a voluntary basis. As the only premier in Australia opposing conscription he came under great pressure; elsewhere Labor parties split over the issue, but Ryan was able to hold together his organization despite numerous charges of disloyalty and treachery. Although he tried not to play a leading part in the first conscription referendum (1916), Ryan's stand led to a serious breach with Hughes. This was intensified in the second referendum in 1917 when he came out as a leading opponent of conscription. On the conscription issue Ryan spoke widely, being acknowledged as the *de facto* leader of its opponents. He sought to elude Hughes's censorship measures by the publication of a special issue of Hansard, but the printing office was raided by Commonwealth officers. Hughes accused Ryan of conspiracy and took him to trial; Ryan replied with contempt charges. Other extreme allegations were also made: Ryan was called a stooge of the Industrial Workers of the World, a tool of Sinn Fein, a friend of Germany (and later of the Bolsheviks). Bitter dissension was raised throughout the whole community but there was an even larger 'No' majority for conscription than in the previous year.,

Some service files still exist, with the "Ryan Thousand" marked on them. The following are excerpts from the newspapers of the time which reflects the story of the "Ryan Thousand". Reference: Ryan, Thomas Joseph (Tom) (1876-1921} by W. Ross Johnston and D.J.Murphy.

The Premier made a statement on Tuesday regarding the recruiting position, with particular reference to what is called "the Ryan Thousand." He said he had had an interview with the recruiting committee during the morning. As he had already stated, Mr. Orchard had asked him some time ago to consent to his name being given -to the first thousand recruits raised, all recruits offering from that date (when Mr. Orchard had seen him) to go towards the "thousand." He had given his

assent. Subsequently he saw Mr. Orchard in Sydney and was given to understand that all recruits, except those who specifically objected, were to be included in the "Ryan Thousand."

It was pointed out to Mr. Ryan at this stage that the statement that all recruits offering from the date of his interview with Mr. Orchard were to be included in the "Thousand" had not previously been officially made, so, consequently, there might have been some misapprehen-

sion.

Mr. Ryan, in reply, said he made a note of the matter at the time of the interview, and that was how he understood it. Continuing, the Premier said he did not think there should be any question of simultaneous rival "thousands". "If any one else," he said, "wishes to have a thousand under his name I will be quite willing to give way to him. It was not a matter of my seeking at all. I was not responsible for the request. I regret to see the con-

John Tighe Ryan, (1870–1922)

John Tighe Ryan (1870?-1922), journalist and editor, was born at Miltown, Clonoulty, Tipperary, Ireland, second surviving son of nine children of Phillip Ryan, landowner, and his wife Margaret, née Tighe. After her husband's death in 1881, Margaret Ryan brought her children to Queensland, settling eventually at Ipswich. Tighe, as he was known, was educated at St Joseph's Christian Brothers' School, Brisbane, and worked on newspapers there and on the *Queensland Times* at Ipswich.

In Sydney by 1893, Ryan joined the staff of the *Daily Telegraph*, contributed to the *Review of Reviews* and met leading politicians and Federationists. He corresponded with Alfred Deakin in 1893 about Federation and requested copy for the *Antipodean* (1893, 1895), an illustrated annual that Ryan edited with George Essex Evans and to which he persuaded Robert Louis Stevenson to contribute. Later Ryan was Australian representative for the *Pall Mall Gazette* and the *Westminster Gazette*. Accepting the editorship of the *Gundagai Times* about 1895, Ryan moved to the Irish heartland of southern New South Wales.

Recommended by P. J. O'Donnell, a local grazier, Ryan in 1897 was appointed editor of the *Catholic Press*, founded in 1895 by Sydney priests who desired a cheap, effective newspaper for laymen who could not afford the sixpenny *Freeman's Journal*; the paper sold for threepence. Ryan followed the standards and tone set by its first clerical editors. The *Catholic Press* met its readers' expectations, supporting Home Rule for Ireland, Australian Federation and protection for local industries. He opposed Britain's role in the South African War, as did many Irishmen who chose to see the Boers fighting for self-determination.

As the *Bulletin* put it, although Ryan 'was extremely combative he was physically frail, so that he had to do all his fighting with tongue or pen'. The fight against conscription in 1916 and 1917 became his great crusade. When war broke out he adopted the Christian consensus view that saw the war as necessary, and likely to produce a world-wide religious revival and show Australia as loyal to the Empire. More inclined to print articles from Catholic thinkers such as G. K. Chesterton and Hilaire Belloc than to concentrate in detail like the *Freeman's Journal* on local matters, Ryan nevertheless reprinted many of Archbishop Kelly's loyal and platitudinous war sermons and in mid-1915 gave qualified support to compulsory enlistment, arguing that the burden of war should be apportioned equitably.

By June 1916 sentiment at the *Catholic Press* was changing, perhaps as a reaction to the Easter tragedy in Dublin. Arguing that it was neither the shirker nor the worker who was impeding the war effort but the commercial system, Ryan called for fairer distribution of wealth and political justice for the Irish nation. In July he depicted the 'heroes' of the uprising in Dublin.

turn the paste over in two folds, throw some more flour over the table, and roll the paste out half-an-inch thick, throw some more flour over the paste, fold and roll again, and repeat this once more; now add one-third of the suet as before, fold and roll again three times; then add the remainder of the suet, fold and roll again three times; it will thus have been folded and rolled nine times, and all the suet and flour will have been used, it should then be left in a cold place for ten minutes, then rolled out, and the pie covered.

This way of making paste is good for all kinds of paste, either made of butter, lard, or dripping, intended to be baked; the only care must be, in the first instance, when the water is mixed with the flour, the paste must be of the same hardness as the butter, &c. One pound of paste made in this manner is equal to two pounds made in any other way. The pie should not be made longer than half-an-hour before it is placed in the oven, and the oven must not be too hot, if so it is better to cover the pie with paper. The pie should first be placed in a hot part of the oven, to prevent the fat becoming greasy and melting; then after about five minutes, placed in a cooler part to cook more slowly. In all meat pies a hole should be made in the paste to allow the unwholesome gas generated by the confined meat cooking to escape.

Irish Chieftain's feast

NO. 32 IRISH PIE

- 16 1/2 lbs. Meat
- 4 lbs. flour
- 1 lb. suet
- 2 lbs black pudding
- 2 lbs onions
- 4 lbs potatoes

Cut the meat from the bone into slices lengthways, and slanting against the grain, beat it well, cut the fat into pieces of about one inch in thickness, cut the puddings, onions, and potatoes into slices, place a layer of meat in the bottom of the dish, season with pepper and salt, then a layer of pudding and onion, another of meat seasoned, another of pudding and onion, until all is used, then add the slices of potatoes, and 12 lbs. of water. Make some paste with the flour as follows : Chop up the suet or fat from the meat very fine, and roll it. Place 3 lbs. of flour on the table, make a hole in the middle, throw in a little salt, and if the flour is good, a pint of water, mix it lightly; when well mixed, and it forms a smooth paste, sprinkle some flour on the table, roll out the paste half an inch thick, sprinkle some flour over the paste, take one-third of the suet, and distribute it over the paste,

By September the case against conscription was being forcefully made in editorials, letters and news reports, despite Kelly's support for W.M.Hughes's and the *Freeman's Journal's* enthusiastic pro-conscription stance. Articles included 'Conscription: the racial and industrial suicide of Australia' and 'Conscription is slavery'. Ryan also became Archbishop Mannix's Sydney champion and led the cult of personality that enveloped Mannix during his public appearances in Sydney in 1918. In 1917 the *Catholic Press's* circulation had doubled over the past year, indicating how well it was satisfying Catholic readers.

The degree to which Ryan's advocacy of the anti-conscription cause influenced lay Catholic opinion must be a matter for conjecture, but he certainly showed the depth of Catholic feeling and in this, perhaps, educated his archbishop. A close friend suggested that his health was undermined by the pressure of the conscription campaigns. He died of cerebral haemorrhage on 20 September 1922 in St Vincent's Hospital and was buried in Rookwood cemetery. The bulk of his estate, valued for probate at £4459, was bequeathed to the poor schools in the Sydney archdiocese. Three of his sisters had entered the religious life and the *Bulletin* regarded Ryan as 'a priest in all but ordination'; he never married and lived with his mother until her death in 1908.

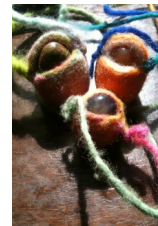

Finished Amulets

Felt Pouch Amulet

Materials:

Wool roving (desired colours).
Cake of soap.
Semi Precious stone of your choice.
A bowl each of hot and cold water.

Method:

This project is to felt around a smallish smooth stone such as a rose quartz. (About the size of an almond in it's shell). Take the wool and tease it out into two lengths to the width of 4cm and a length of 40 cm. It should be a fine thickness. Wrap the wool flatly and firmly around the stone. Then take another length and wrap this across the uncovered sides of the stone. Make sure that it does not twist. Now you are ready to do your water work. Have a bowl each of hot and cold water and a bar of soap. Lather your hands with soap, pick up your wrapped stone, immerse it in hot water and move it gently between your hands. When it begins to ball apply pressure and roll in between your cupped hands. Keep your hands soapy. Treat it gently like a little baby. As it gets more formed dip it into cold water, now you can be a little rougher. Repeat the rolling process alternating between hot and cold water. Apply pressure and roll until little hairs form - it looks hairy and it is no longer soapy.. Get a towel and pat and squeeze dry. Cut a slit. Which will reveal your beautiful gem.

Make a cord by rolling The required length of wool between your hands like a slithery snake, until it is felted. Knot the ends, sew to the sides of your pouch and there it is!

Volar! Your Amulet Pouch.

"Don't mind that; don't be vexed," said the henwife; "maybe it's the best thing that ever happened to you."

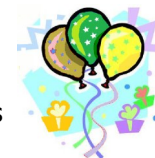

It had a team of eight people producing a camper trailer each day and soon became the Number one player in the Australian camper/caravan industry, becoming one of the great success stories of Australian manufacturing. He's also the chairman of RV (Recreational Vehicle) accessories specialist, Coast to Coast, which operates retail outlets across four States.

In a speech delivered at his induction into the Victorian Manufacturing Hall of Fame in 2006, Gerry admitted he got into the RV manufacturing industry "by accident".

In the early 1970s he was "serving time" in the accounting department of AMP. With the minerals boom in full swing and feeling a "bit restless", he decided to join one of his brothers "earning big dollars" in the West.

Instead, he walked into a "fill in" job on the production line at Sunwagon Camper Trailers in Melbourne.

After quickly rising to foreman and then production manager, responsible for 100 employees, he was sent to the US to study the

He returned with "a head full of ideas" but with seemingly little interest in Sunwagon, at age 24 he decided to go it alone and "started Jayco in an old shed in Cranbourne".

"Determined to take the plunge", Gerry started building the first prototypes in 1975 and by January 1976 had set up a factory and was rolling the first Jayco campers off the line.

At the time there were just eight workers – six of whom were still with the company 30 years later!

He's a former President of the Recreational Vehicle Manufacturers' Association of Australia, and a founding member and former chairman of the national leisure and tourism body, Caravanning Australia.

Gerry's influence extends well beyond the RV industry and he's been one of Australia's biggest individual supporters of the entertainment and sporting industries as well as the local community over the past 20 years.

Various sports from elite to local level including cycling, basketball, netball, motocross, AFL and rugby league, have benefitted from his generosity and enthusiasm. Gerry has been involved with Road Cycling in Australia, supporting the careers of many of our now prominent riders. He is presently forging ahead to put together a team of Australian riders for the next Tour de France. The team 'Green Edge' is underwritten by up to \$60million from his own deep pockets, to fund an Australian team on the UCI World Tour for three years. His commitment and energy has been behind the Melbourne Storm, he has also supported women's netball.

That is not all, his company is about to launch his next arena spectacular based on the book 'How to train your Dragon', next year 2012. It opens in Brisbane in March. Work has already begun on his third production 'King Kong'.

His support of local community initiatives includes acting as the founding chairman of the Visy Cares Centre in Dandenong, which provides youth support services in Melbourne's south-east.
