Convicts on the First Fleet From the "LONDON GAZETTE", October 1788. CONVICTS TRANSPORTED TO THE NEW COLONY

'Your Correspondent looks to our Readers and has ascertained as far as possible the names of those who have been convicted of crimes in the **Country of England since** 1783 and have



been sentenced by His Majestv's Judges to be sent to that part of New Holland known as **New South** Wales.

Your Correspondent looks to our Readers for their indulgence to involuntary errors and omissions, and trust general attention will secure us from trespassing on their kindness too often. '

Capt. Arthur Phillip, R.N. was commissioned as the first Governor of New South Wales. He set sail on May 13th, 1787 from Portsmouth with 11 vessels [Alexander, Lady Penrhyn, Charlotte, Scarborough, Friendship, Prince of Wales; supplies, equipment and livestock on Borrowdale, Fishburn, Golden Grove; navy ships, man-o'-war Sirius and armed tender Supply. He arrived in N.S.W. with 717 convicts of whom 180 were women, guarded by 191 marines under 19 officers.

John Ryan - Convict - First Fleet Was he the first Australian Ryan?

John RYAN

Alternative names: BRYANT

He was tried at Old Bailey, London on 14 January 1784 for stealing clothing with a value of 13 shillings. He was sentenced to transportation for 7 years and left England on the *Friendship* aged about 23 at that time (May 1787). His occupation was listed as silk weaver. He died in 1815(?). (Which would make him 50 years at the time of his death)

Notes:

Guilty of return from transport following the Mercury mutiny. Report from Dunkirk hulk was "in general tolerably well behaved but troublesome at times". Accused of theft of food and sentenced on 27 February 1788 to receive 300 lashes, but was forgiven.

John Ryan may not have been the only Ryan transported on the first fleet. As he had the alternative name of Bryant, it is possible that three men by the name of Bryant may have in fact been Ryans.

However John Ryan is the only individual recorded under the surname RYAN.

Second Fleet

A second fleet of six ships left England - Guardian, Justinian, Lady Juliana, Surprize, Neptune, Scarborough. The Guardian struck ice, and was unable to complete the voyage. She was stocked with provisions. Only 48 people died in the first group of ships, but this time 278 died during the voyage. This time transporting the convicts was in the hands of private contractors.

From the "SYDNEY COVE CHRONICLE", 30th June, 1790.

At last the transports are here

DIABOLICAL CONDITION OF THE CONVICTS THEREON

278 died on the fearsome journey to Sydney Cove

"... The landing of those who remained alive despite their misuse upon the recent voyage, could not fail to horrify those who watched.

As they came on shore, these wretched people were hardly able to move hand or foot. Such as could not carry themselves upon their legs, crawled upon all fours. Those, who, through their afflictions, were not able to move, were thrown over the side of the ships; as sacks of flour would be thrown, into the small boats.

Some expired in the boats; others as they reached the shore. Some fainted and were carried by those who fared better. More had not the opportunity even to leave their ocean prisons for as they came upon the decks, the fresh air only hastened their demise.

A sight most outrageous to our eyes were the marks of leg irons upon the convicts, some so deep that one could nigh on see the bones We learn that several children have been borne to women upon the Lady Juliana, the cause for which were the crews aboard African slave ships which met up with the transport at Santa Cruz. So the Guardian is lost and with it our provisions. What, in the name of Heaven, is to become of us?..."

The third fleet of 11 ships [Atlantic, William and Ann, Britannia, Matilda, Salamander, Albemarle, Mary Anne, Admiral Barrington, Active and Gorgon arrived in 1791, with over 2000 convicts. The newspaper report states that 194 male convicts and 4 female convicts died during the voyage, and that though conditions on board ship weren't as "diabolical" as the previous year, they were still outrageous.

The convicts from Ireland who arrived on board the "Oueen" are not included in the **newspaper lists.** (I have not yet found the convict list for the 'Queen')

As before, the list was compiled in London and so there is no way of knowing which people died on the voyage out, or did not leave England for any reason.

Our readers will find hereunder a List of Persons transported as Criminals to New South Wales in the Ships as following, via: Atlantic, William and Ann, Britannia, Matilda, Salamander, Albemarle, Mary Anne, Admiral Barrington, Active and Gorgon.

Extracted from the List: **RYAN** Thomas Middlesex 7 The first ship to sail directly from Ireland carrying convicts under sentence of transportation was the *Queen*, which arrived in Port Jackson on 26 September 1791.

Transportation from Ireland to Australia effectively came to an end in 1853. The last ship to carry convicts directly from Ireland to Australia was the *Phoebe Dunbar*, which sailed from Kingstown (now Dun Laoghaire) near Dublin and arrived in Western Australia on 30 August 1853. During the 62 years of transportation from Ireland to Australia, some 30,000 men and 9,000 women were sent as convicts to Australia for a minimum period of seven years - many more followed their loved ones as free settlers to a new life in the colony.

Transportation sentences were for periods of seven years (the most common), ten years, fourteen years or life. The nature of the sentencing policy behind these terms has not been fully researched. Linked with political conflict and agrarian unrest, the view that Irish men and women were transported for trivial first offences such as petty theft, has become part of Irish tradition.

The sentence of transportation was abolished in July 1857 under an Act of that year, but the Act allowed for convicts sentenced to penal servitude to be sent 'beyond the seas'. By this means, transportation continued from England until 1868. As far as is known, nobody convicted of a crime committed in Ireland was transported to Australia between 1853 and 1868, although no doubt some persons of Irish birth or origin who were convicted of crimes committed in England were among those transported to Australia. However in 1868 sixty three Irish Fenians who had been convicted in Ireland but imprisoned in England were transported from England. They arrived in Western Australia on 9 January 1868 on board the *Hougoumont*, the last convict transport ship to sail from England to Australia.

Many trails can be followed in searching the convict story. I have made a very small dip into the resources available to show the Ryan presence in Australia's white history. I have looked at the CONVICT TICKETS, for example: Certificate of Freedom; Ticket of Leave Passport; Recommended Conditional Pardon; Convict Death Register; Ticket of Leave; Certificate of Emancipation; Bank Warrant; Free Pardon

I have only searched for Ryans and only searched for the following Christian Names, I have placed the number of individuals of that name alongside. Whilst some of these tickets may have been awarded to the same individual and few Christian names have been searched, the tally of Ryans is impressive.

A VICTUALLING LIST shows the names of 3217 men, women and children who were issued with rations in Sydney on Saturday September 8, 1821. Below are Ryans who were on that list.

Whilst not able to fully demonstrate all Ryans who arrived on Convict Ships, I think it is shown that a significant number of Australia's first settlers were bearers of the name RYAN.

The Irish Wolfhound

The Irish Wolfhound—An Ancient Breed

The breed is very old; there are suggestions it may have been brought to Ireland as early as 7000 BC. These dogs are mentioned, as cú (variously translated as hound, Irish hound, war dog, wolf dog, etc.) in Irish laws and in Irish literature which dates from the 5th century or, in the case of the Sagas, from the old Irish period - AD 600-900.

The breed almost disappeared, but was successfully revived by efforts of the captain of the British Army D E Graham to recreate it, he drew the line related to Wolfhounds. As a result, has developed a modern breed, Irish Wolfhounds. Today they are well established themselves as companions and guards. The word "Cu" often became an added respected prefix on the names of warriors, such as Cú Chulainn, the Hound of Ulster, as well as kings denoting that they were worthy of the respect and loyalty of a Cu.

Pre-19th century

Ancient wood cuts[citation needed] and writings have placed them in existence as a breed by 273 BC. However there is indication that they existed even as early as 600 BC when the Tectosages and Tolistobogii Celts sacked Delphi. Survivors left accounts of the fierce Celts and the huge dogs who fought with them and at their side. They were mentioned by Julius Caesar in his treatise, The Gallic

Wars, and by 391 BC, they were written about by Roman Consul, Quintus Aurelius Symmachus, who received seven of them as a gift to be used for fighting lions, bears, that in his words, "all Rome viewed with wonder".

Bred as hunting dogs by the ancients, who called them Cú Faoil. The Irish continued to breed them for this purpose, as well as to guard their homes and protect their stock. Cúchulain, a name which translates literally as "hound of Culain", gained his name when as a child, known then as Setanta, he slew the ferocious guard dog of Culain forcing him to offer himself as a replacement.

Wolf hunting with wolfhounds

During the English Conquest of Ireland, only the nobility were allowed to own Irish Wolfhounds, the numbers permitted depending on position. They were much coveted and were frequently given as gifts to important personages and foreign nobles. Wolfhounds were the companions of the regal, and were housed themselves alongside them. King John of England, in about 1210 presented an Irish hound, Gelert to Llewellyn, a prince of Wales. The poet The Hon William Robert Spencer immortalised this hound in a poem.

In his Historie of Ireland completed 1571, Blessed Edmund Campion gives a description 10 Vol 18 Issue 2

of the hounds used for hunting the wolves on the Dublin and Wicklow mountains. He says: They (the Irish) are not without wolves and greyhounds to hunt them, bigger of bone and limb than a colt. Due to their popularity overseas many were exported to European royal houses leaving numbers in Ireland depleted. This led to a declaration by Oliver Cromwell himself being published in Kilkenny on 27 April 1652 to ensure that sufficient numbers remained to control the wolf population.

The largest and most beautiful of the dog kind

References to the Irish wolfhound in the 18th century tell of its great size, strength and greyhound shape as well as its scarcity. Writing in 1790, Bewick described it as the largest and most beautiful of the dog kind; about 36 inches high, generally of a white or cinammon colour, somewhat like the Greyhound but more robust. He said that their aspect was mild, disposition peaceful, and strength so great that in combat the Mastiff or Bulldog was far from being an equal to them. The last wolf in Ireland is thought to have been killed at Myshall, Co Carlow in 1786 by a pack of wolfdogs kept by a Mr Watson of Ballydarton. The remaining hounds in the hands of a few families who were mainly descendants of the old Irish chieftains, were now symbols of status rather than hunters, they were said to be the last of their race

Modern wolfhound

Englishman Captain George Augustus Graham is responsible with a few other breeders for reaffirming the dogs' existence. In 1879 he wrote: "It has been ascertained beyond all question that there are few specimens of the breed still left in Ireland and England to be considered Irish wolfhounds, though falling short of the requisite dimensions. This blood is now in my possession." Captain Graham devoted his life to ensuring the survival of the Irish wolfdog. Owing to the small numbers of surviving specimens outcrossing was used in

the breeding programme. It is believed that Great Dane, Deerhound and Mastiff dogs all played their part in Graham's creation of the dog we currently know. In 1885 Captain Graham with other breeders founded the Irish Wolfhound Club, and the Breed Standard of Points to establish and agree the ideal to which breeders should aspire.

The Irish Wolfhound is sometimes regarded as the national dog breed of Ireland but in fact no breed has ever been officially adopted as such. The Wolfhound was historically a dog that only nobles could own and was taken up by the British during their rule in Ireland. This made it unpopular as a national symbol and the Kerry Blue Terrier was adopted by Republicans such as Michael Collins. However, in recent years, the Wolfhound has been adopted as a symbol by both rugby codes, which are organised on an All-Ireland basis. The national rugby league team are nicknamed the wolfhounds, and the Irish Rugby Football Union, which governs rugby union, changed the name of the country's A (second-level) national team in that code to the Ireland Wolfhounds in 2010.

STEAK AND GUINNESS PIE

Makes 1 pie - 4 servings

12 inch Pie pastry

1 or 2 pounds of Round steak

1 tablespoon of Flour

1 tablespoon of Brown sugar

1 tablespoon of Raisins

5 medium size onions

1 bottle of Guinness stout (not the 'draught' variety)

8 slices of bacon

3 tablespoon of shortening/butter

Some Chopped parsley

Dice the steak, cover with flour and brown, with the bacon, on a medium heat using the butter.

Peel and chop the onions and brown over a good heat. Add to the meat in a caserole dish. Add raisins and brown sugar and Guinness.

Cover the dish, simmer and cook over a lowish heat for 2.5 hours. Add water if the gravy mixuture starts to thicken excessively.

Coat a pie dish with half of the pastry and bake.

Add the Meat and Gravy mix when cooked and place the remaining pastry on top and bake for 10 minutes or until golden brown.

Serve with potatoes and vegtables.

LEMON CURD

Serves 2

8 tablespoons of unsalted butter

1 cup of white sugar

1 cup of fresh lemon juice

8 large egg yolks

2 tablespoons of grated lemon peel

Mix all of the ingredients, (except the lemon peel), in a saucepan.

Stirring well, cook over a very low heat.

Do not let the mixture boil or the eggs will curdle and be ruined.

Cook until a creamy consistency is reached.

Pour into a small desert bowl and garnish with the lemon peel.

Allow to cool and then serve.

IRISH COFFEE

60 ml of Irish Whiskey 1 teaspoon of brown sugar Freshly made strong black coffee Double cream freshly whipped to peak

Gently warm an Irish Whiskey/Cofee glass in hot water. Pour whiskey and sugar into the glass and stir. Add the fresh made coffee filling the glass to within half an inch or so of the top. Pour the cream onto the top of the mixture gently using the back of a spoon to prevent splashing. Do not stir. Add grated chocolate to the top if required.

REASON FOR LOSS:

Took off at 23.41 hrs to join 132 Lancaster's of 1 Group and 15 pathfinder Mosquitoes to bomb the railway yards and buildings. The raid was classed as a success with reports that 287 bombs had hit the target. Damage included 30 locomotives hit and the engine shed. 340 houses were also destroyed and 14 civilians were killed. This was all part of several other raids taking place this night - all concentrating on the railway yards at Tours, Tergnier, Laon, Ghent and Aulnoye.

8 lancaster were lost on this raid (one lost on take off) with the resulting death of 39 aircrew, 4 were made pow's and 6 evaded capture.

Lancaster ND586 was shot down by Hptm. Helmut Bergmann (1) of 8./NJG4 with the combat taking place at 3,000 mtrs. The aircraft crashing 10 km. south west of Maubeuge at Vieux Mesnil at 02.20 hrs. He opened fire at a range of 100 mtrs from underneath the Lancaster. (Taken from a combat report by Hptm. Bergmann) We are reliably informed that small pieces of wreckage from this Lancaster has recently been found by a group of French researchers and they are very interested in contacting relatives of the crew. They have already managed to contact the daughter of Sqt. Dennis Robbins. (All families have been contacted except those of F/O Keith Ryan) This was the 19th confirmed claim for Hptm. Bergmann (7 on this raid alone!) He went on to claim a total of 34 kills before he was killed on the 6/7th August 1944 when he was shot down by Fl/Lt. John Surman in a Mosquito MM449 from 604 squadron. We are eager to contact relatives of this crew, as the crash site has recently been identified - possible memorial planned.


